SUMMARY

The Russian Revolution took place in 1917 under the leadership of Lenin. The Russian state participated in the First World War that began in 1914. The war created the scarcity of essential goods leading to food riots at several places. Riots over the scarcity of food broke out in the capital, Petrograd (formerly St. Petersburg), on February 24 (March 8), and, when most of the soldiers joined the revolt, Tsar Nicholas II was forced to abdicate his throne. A provisional government was set up in Russia but the Bolshevik party at this time had become extremely powerful. The party under Lenin overthrew the Provisional Government and Russia became a socialist country following the principles and ideologies of Karl Marx. Land was taken away from landlords and were given to the farmers. Workers were given the control of the factories and the state became powerful. The Russian Revolution impacted the world in a huge way. Communist parties were established in several countries and the world was divided into two blockscapitalist and communist.

PREFACE

The Graphic Novel - The Russian Revolution is a history of industrial and social change which includes socialism as a form of government, displays New Economic Policy and mass destruction in other wars. The content of the book provides vivid reading material with creative illustrations and explicit dialogues. 

Robert Owen, a Welsh textile manufacturer, philanthropist and a social reformer, was one of the founder of Utopian Socialism and the cooperative movement.




Karl Marx

Friedrich Engels was a German philosopher, historian, political scientist and revolutionary socialist.




Joseph Stalin




Georgy Gapon

Tsar Nicholas II was the last Emperor of All Russia, ruled from November 1894 until his abdication in March 1917.




Alexandra Feodorovna

Alexandra Feodorovna was Empress of Russia married to Tsar Nicholas II.




Grigori Rasputin


Born: 21 January 1869, Pokrovskoye, Siberia, Russian Empire Died: 30 December 1916, Saint Petersburg, Russian Empire

Industrialisation brought men, women and children to factories



- 2. While others wanted government to encourage cooperative to replace capitalists. This gave birth to the idea of communist society.



WORLD WAR AND THE RUSSIAN EMPIRE

First world war gained popularity in Russia, as people worshiped Tsar Nicholas II.



Soon Tsar left St. Petersburg to oversee the armies. He handed over the reign to his Alexandra.

Sentiments in people were running high. Their hopes devastated.



Due to poor advisors like Rasputin, autocracy became unpopular in Russia.

Alexandra consulted Rasputin (a Monk) in all matters of the states. I need your help, Rasputin.

(Do not worry; I understand the sentiments of the people, I will help you.




Thanks Rasputin!

After Russia's increasing defeat in the World War I, Rasputin lost his popularity and was assassinated by a group of conservatives.




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THE FEBRUARY REVOLUTION

On February 22, 1917 a lockout took place at a factory in the capital Petrograd.



Workers called a strike which was led by women.



Soon, the soldiers joined the striking workers. Together they formed a 'Soviet' or 'Council' which was called the 'Petrograd Soviet'



Thus, hunger and protest led the way to abdication of Tsar Nicholas II.

The 'Petrograd Soviet' led the way to abolition of monarchay and establishment of democracy.



A provisional Government was formed, universal adult suffrage was adopted.

RETURN OF LENIN

In April 1917, Bolsheviks leader Vladimir Lenin returned to Russia from exile. He found it right to take power in his hands and thus demanded:

War should end.

Lands should be transferred to the peasants.

Banks should be nationalised.

These demands came to be known as 'Lenin's April Theses'



Due to Lenin's April Thesis people lost trust on Provisional Government and influence of the Bolshevik party could be seen as -:

Trade unions grew in numbers.

Soldiers' committees were formed in the army.

500 soviets joined All Russian Congress of Soviets.

Land committees were formed which encouraged the peasants to seize the land.

Students, let me take you back to 1917.





REVOLUTION OF OCTOBER 1917

Bolshevik ideologies attracted the support of soldiers, peasants, soviets, and factory workers. A military revolutionary committee was formed to organize the seizure of the Winter Palace in Petrograd.



As the result, on 24th October Winter Palace was occupied from all sides. Uprisings took place in other cities as well. Bolsheviks controlled the Moscow Petrograd area.



WHAT CHANGED AFTER OCTOBER 1917?

- 1. Industries and banks were nationalised in November 1917.







That is good. * Today, I will take you to the journey of Civil War.




THE CIVIL WAR

The non – Bolsheviks pushed Russia towards civil war. It was supported by the troops of France, America, Britain and Japan.

As a result, in December 1922, non-Russian nationalists were given political autonomy in the Soviet Union (USSR).



Looting, banditry and famine became common during the civil war.



Making of a socialist society.

Bolsheviks introduced centralized planning. They introduced five-year plans which gave pace to the economic growth.



Factories came to be seen as a symbol of socialism.

- An extended schooling system was also developed.
- Cheap public health care was provided.
- Model living quarters were setup for workers.

STALINISM AND COLLECTIVISATION

Planned economy did not gave fruitful results. After the death of Lenin, Joseph Stalin headed the party.










Russia was facing acute shortage of grain supplies.



GLOBAL INFLUENCE OF THE RUSSIAN REVOLUTION

By the end of the second world war, Socialism spread as an acknowledged system in all parts of the world. It brought a backward country as a powerful one. 'Socialism' in its real practice deprived the essential freedom to its citizens. It's policies were repressive. It was a great success if seen from the eyes of any Asian but a repressive practice if you ask any Russian.



By the 1950's each country sought the idea of socialism in different ways.









TIME LINE

- 1. 1792 Marseillaise was written as a war song.
- 2. 1896 1897 Strikes took place in textile industries.
- 3. 1898 The Russian Social Democratic Workers Party was founded.
- 4. 1900 Socialist Revolutionary Party formed.
- 5. 1902 Strikes took place in metal industries.
- 6. 1904 Russia suffered humiliating defeats in a war against Japan which led to protests and calls for reform.
- 7. 1905 After Bloody Sunday, Nicholas II argued to allow a Duma, or legislature for the people.
- 8. 1914 Russia entered WWI and quickly suffered heavy losses in major defeats to Germany along the Eastern Front.
- 9. 1914 Tsar Nicholas II ruled Russia and its empire.
- 10. 1914 1916 Russia's armies lost badly in Germany and Austria.
- 11. March 1917 Revolts in Petrograd forced Tsar to abdicate and a provisional republic was established.
- 12. October 1917 Socialists took over the government in Russia through the October Revolution of 1917.
- 13. November 1917 Lenin and the Bolsheviks take control in Petrograd and overthrow the republic.
- 14. 1918 1921 Bolsheviks (Reds) fight and win a civil war against the White army.
- 15. 1922 Lenin established the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics under the control of the Communist Party.
- 16. 1929 Stalin became the sole ruler of the USSR and created a totalitarian state.


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


















From the Desk of Joint Director
