

A Collective Effort


The postmaster, a kind and generous man, decided to help. He initiated a collection among his colleagues and friends to raise money for Lencho.

The Anonymous Gift


They managed to collect 70 pesos, which was then sent to Lencho anonymously, signed simply as "God."
